



ASQ Discussion

Finishing up the first round of DRDP in every program. Teachers have been providing families with activities that align with the school readiness goals. This helps to ensure that our families understand that each child is unique and can succeed when their needs are met.

Guiding principles that are fundamental especially during the pandemic are that Learning occurs within the context of relationships-Establishing relationships is vital to our children and families to succeed. They need those real life connections to feel grounded and supported. This involves being responsive to parents and encouraging supportive interactions that are essential to a child's learning experience.

Every child has diverse strengths rooted in their family's culture, background, language and beliefs. Being responsive and respectful is important to children too. Our teachers are encouraged to create a classroom environment that builds on the culture the children create within the classroom as well as pieces of what makes them unique as individuals.

Dual Immersion

In order to meet the Dual Immersion requirements and maintain social distance, the Dual Immersion teachers are using the promethean boards to share class time with the 2nd language counterpart in real time. Teachers are choosing different portions of the day to review vocabulary, concepts and activities throughout the day. This new strategy has proven to be more effective because children have a more "hands-on" opportunity to share time, experiences and ideas in the second language with their peers.

Classroom Support

During the month of September, the Mental Health Specialist supported 7 teachers with materials to support either classroom needs or needs of the family. These concerns were addressing parent concerns that were discovered in either the classroom setting or through the ASQ process. Materials were sent home to support the parent in the home environment. (Goal 1 and Goal 3)

Student Support

Palmdale ECE works towards supporting the developmental needs of all students. In the month of September, Disabilities supported 82 children with developmental concerns with 27 of those students in varies stages of referrals with the child's LEA. Teachers individualize for developmental concerns monthly to help support the needs of each student. (Goal 1, Goal 2 and Goal 3).

IEP Goals

During the month of September, Disabilities Specialist attended 14 IEP meetings through the LEA (Local Education Agency). These IEP meetings included initial IEP's when assessment results are discussed with the family and annual IEP meetings. Annual IEP meetings occur once a year to discuss IEP goals and collaboratively discuss if the goals have been met or need to be adjusted to meet the child's current developmental needs. Palmdale ECE has been working closely with First Steps to help families through the process of assessment and to support IEP goals. (Goal 1 and Goal 2)

Second Steps

Second Steps Social Emotional Curriculum is currently being used in the classroom to support student's social-emotional needs. The following topics and support materials were sent to the teacher in the month of September; week 4 Self-Talk, Week 5 Following Directions, Week 6 Asking for What you Need or Want and week 7 Identifying Feelings. (Goal 1 and Goal 2)






NUTRITION REPORT

Safe and Nutritious Meals

As the school year continues, the nutrition department works together with other service areas in the Multidisciplinary Team Meetings (MDTM) to provide students with individualized care. Menus are still being sent out to staff and families every two weeks, and are posted outside of classrooms. The Nutritionist will begin meal observations in the near future to ensure safe delivery of nutritious meals. Meal accommodations, nutrition screening forms and referrals are also continuously completed as we enroll new students each day. The Nutrition area is collecting heights and weights from the classrooms to provide interventions for students who are not in the healthy weight class status. (Goal #1, #2, & #3)





SEPT 2021 EARLY HEAD START EXPENDITURES







2021-2022 School Year Updates

We continue to work on filling staffing vacancies as well as assess new positions that need to be added to help our program run more efficiently. We are in the process of adding a Warehouse/Delivery Driver and Family Health Provider to aid with increasing workloads in those areas.

Shortened Days for Full Day Classes

We received approval to implement Shortened Days on Fridays for our 5-day Full Day classes. Children in full day classes will be dismissed at 2:00 p.m. on Fridays to allow teachers time for professional development, home visits, parent conferences, and teacher collaboration. This change is needed as we do not have enough teacher substitutes to cover classes to allow for these activities to occur as we have in the past. It is crucial that we create time for our teaching staff to plan, learn and complete the many tasks (i.e. assessments, observations, follow-ups, referrals) that are required by our program and the Office of Head Start.

We will begin this early dismissal schedule on Friday, December 10th.

This year, we continue to utilize the "Daily Health Cards" on the Learning Genie app. Monitoring the health of our students each day has allowed us to significantly mitigate the spread of COVID-19. We want to remind parents to please notify our health team immediately when your child is exposed to COVID-19 outside of school or tests positive. As soon as we have this information, we take the necessary steps based on the Los Angeles Department of Public Health guidelines. This includes parent notification, putting exposed children and staff in quarantine, completing contact tracing, and sanitizing the classroom. Our priority is ensuring the health and safety of our children, staff, and families. Working together we can get through this!
