

December Enrollment



Program attendance for the month of December was at 75.35%. The Office of Head Start attendance threshold requires all programs to be at 85% and above. This is an increase of 2.53% from the previous month. As a program, we have been providing information to families about the importance of good attendance and providing support to families.

For the month of December, Child Plus report 2301 was used to monitor monthly attendance at PSD-ECE sites. The goal is that the overall average at each PSD-ECE meets the 85% and above Head Start attendance threshold.



Teachers will continue to conduct visual health checks during morning arrival and practice routine handwashing with children several times throughout the day, which is embedded in the classroom daily routine.

CLASS Observations

In December 2022, CLASS observations were completed in 49 out of 53 classrooms. CLASS data aggregation was completed in January 2023. CLASS data will be shared with PSD-ECE parents in the month of January during the Policy Committee Meeting. In addition, the School Readiness and Education Coordinators worked on the CLASS program plan with Region IX Training and Technical Assistance Specialist and CCRC.

CLASS observations were conducted by CLASS certified and reliable staff. CLASS data is then analyzed and aggregated for program overall as well as each site and classroom. As part of continuous quality program improvement, the CLASS outcome information is used for current and future professional development trainings for the PSD-ECE teaching staff.

DID YOU KNOW...

Showing up on time every day is important to your child's success and learning from preschool forward.

Missing 10% of school (1 or 2 days every few weeks) can make it harder to:

- · Gain early reading and math skills.
- · Build relationships.
- · Develop good attendance habits.

High quality preschool and kindergarten has many benefits!

- · The routines your child develops will continue throughout school.
- · Make the most of early grades by encouraging your child to attend every day.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Work with your child and his/her teacher to develop your child's strong attendance.

Talk about it - sing about it - make it an adventure!

- · Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- · Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- · Share ideas with other parents for getting to school on time.

Before the school year starts

- · Find out what day school starts and begin a countdown!
- · Keep your child healthy and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Attend orientation with your child to meet teachers and classmates and find out about health and safety procedures.

Ready, Set, GO!

- If you are concerned your child may have Covid-19, call your school for advice. Ask for resources to continue learning at home if needed.
- · Ask family members or neighbors for assistance if you need help.
- Try to schedule non-Covid-19 medical appointments and extended trips when school is not in session.
- If your child seems anxious about preschool or kindergarten, talk to the program director, teacher, your doctor or other parents for advice.

CLASS Observations

In December, the CLASS team completed CLASS observations in center-based classrooms. Teachers were given feedback and the data will be analyzed to be used for program planning, which includes professional development, classroom environment and a Coaching Plan.

In the Classroom

In December, teachers were trained on the DRDP, Learning Language Development through Intentional Play and Promoting Learning and Persistence Through Intentional Play.

The month of December was short, but nevertheless, a busy month. Children and teachers wrapped up the year in a fun and creative way. The classrooms engaged in a variety of fun activities such as Red and White Day and Pajama Day. Teachers and children got into the spirit of week-long celebrations. Some of the classes from Tumbleweed and Highland shared their silly antics in these adorable pictures. In Head Start we work hard and play just as hard!







The center based preschool classrooms use the Creative Curriculum as their core curriculum. The curriculum is a play-based curriculum that follows children's interest and is organized in studies where children take the lead on investigating topics of interest they can relate to and are familiar with as part of their everyday lives. Some studies include: The Ball Study, The Building Study, the Box Study, The Tree Study, the Pet Study. The list of studies is long and children and teachers choose a study they are interested in and dive into the investigation of that study in a variety of ways.

In accordance with the Creative Curriculum, the classrooms are organized in interest areas. The curriculum is centered around the following 11 interest areas: blocks, dramatic play, toys and games, art, library, discovery, sand and water, music and movement, cooking, computers, and outdoors. The curriculum describes the learning that occurs through play in each area, the ways children might engage with the materials in each area, and teacher interactions to promote and scaffold children's learning.

The curriculum includes the use of project-based investigations, known as the "studies," that are focused on meaningful science and social studies topics and aim to provide children with an opportunity to apply skills in literacy, math, the arts, and technology. While visiting the classrooms, I had the opportunity to engage with and photograph some children engaged in these interest areas.

Development Concerns Support and IEPs

During the month of December, Disabilities supported 123 children and families that have developmental concerns in both the EHS and HS program. There were also seven referrals submitted for assessments to the appropriate LEA (Local Education Agency). Disabilities Specialist attended nine IEP meetings during the month. (Goal 1, Goal 2 and Goal 3)

Mindful Moments

Mindful Moments for December centered around the power of peppermint and included practical uses, recipes and some information on how iconic peppermint items are made. There was also a mindful calendar to provide everyday activities to support personal wellness.

Mindful activities included calming the storm, which uses a snow globe to help promote self -regulation and mindful thoughts (Goal 1, Goal 2 and Goal 3)



Supporting Wellness

On December 9, 2022, the Disabilities and Mental Health Department put on a painting activity to support wellness for office staff. The theme was "Happy Little Accidents" which is a reference to painter Bob Ross. He had a show called "The Joy of Painting" from 1983-1994 where he taught people to paint through a positive lens and view point. Staff had the opportunity to utilize the mindful activity of art to reconnect with other staff and themselves. Future wellness opportunities will be planned to support staff wellness. (Goal 3)





HEALTH REPORT

Health Team

The health team is fully staffed with one registered nurse, four LVN's, and one administrative clerk. Each LVN has had their case load reduced from approximately 400 students to 300 students each. The increase in staff has allowed for more timely follow up and additional classroom support with medically fragile students. Due to the increased follow-up, the number of physical exams has greatly increased within the first month from 60% on December 1, 2022 to 69% as of January 17, 2023.

Currently, 324 out of 1050 Head Start students have not submitted their physical exam for the 2022-2023 school year. The health team is currently working with these families by identifying their needs and offering our support. We have made appointments, offered community resources, participated in health events, transportation and submitted fax to support in obtaining documents.



ChildPlus Monitoring

The health team has been meeting every Thursday and have been focused on Child Plus. All staff members bring their laptops. Staff follow along while instruction is given on the Promethean board by the Health & Safety Specialist. To date, each team member has created their own To-Do-List for immunizations, physicals and dental exams, missing documents, and hearing and vision for HS and EHS. They have also become proficient using Child Plus report 3035 and 3016 (EHS). They have customized their reports by using the advanced set up option. Every week we plan to review additional reports such as 3330, 9740, 9706.



Program Governance Recap August-December 2022

The Policy Committee (PC) has been meeting the last Wednesday of the month from August to December to discuss and approve action items for the program. PC meetings consist of 30 elected parents (representatives and alternates), invited parents, and staff. 

Safe and Nutritious Meals

The Nutrition Department works continuously to assure that children receive safe and nutritious meals. In the month of December, the Nutrition Department continues monitoring of our classrooms during meal service to check for food safety and ensure safe mealtime practices. (Goal 2)



Ball Study Culminating Activity

The Nutrition Department provided individualized, nutrition-related support to 12 classrooms. This included support for classrooms completing their Ball Study Culminating Activity, where students learned how to make no-bake peanut butter oatmeal balls. This activity promoted discussion of nutrition in the various ingredients and areas of development such as math, measuring, and fine motor skills. (Goals 1, 2, 3)



Expenditures for Head Start, HS T&TA, Early Head Start, EHS T&TA & COVID Programs




Palmdale School District continues to offer breakfast and lunch through the Child & Adult Care Food

Safety

Health and Safety and Care and Supervision (C & S)are the priority. According to 1302.47(2) - Safety Practices - Equipment and materials - Indoor and outdoor play equipment and materials are to be cleaned and safe for children's use and are appropriately disinfected. We have an ongoing system of preventative maintenance and the staff is required to follow all of our safety procedures at all times. Our Health and Safety policies include, but are not limited to, emergencies, arrival and dismissal procedures, reporting any accidents or unusual incidents, and Care and Supervision.

Our program works with the custodian and teaching staff to ensure that cleaning and sanitizing is happening on a regular basis. During the Winter Break, our Custodial staff conducts their deep cleaning which includes cleaning the window sills, remove any spiderwebs, shampoo carpets and rugs, and clean the outside environment.

Lead Sampling

Lead Testing was conducted this month at all of the kitchens that prepare food for our ECE students. Water outlets were checked to ensure we are in compliance with the standards of lead contamination.

Incident Reports

For any accidents or injuries, the teaching staff completes Incident Reports and submits them to the our Health Service Area. The nurses enter the incident report into ChildPlus. Currently, for the month of November and December, there were 13 incident reports submitted which is taken from ChildPlus Report #3035.

Potential Program Changes for the 2023-2024 School Year

With the expansion of Universal Transitional Kindergarten (UTK), we continue to explore ways to continue providing quality services to the community through the Early Childhood Education program. In the 2022-2023 school year, we began servicing more three-year-olds in our program as more four-year-olds were eligible for UTK. We also decreased the number of center-based enrollment slots in order to increase the number of full day classes offered, so parents had more opportunities to participate in that program option if it better met their family needs. This also allowed us to maintain the quality of the services provided to families.


For the 2023-2024 school year, we will be conducting community needs assessments to determine and plan for any additional program changes needed.

Office of Head Start Mask Mandate Lifted

On January 6, 2023, the Office of Head Start officially rescinded the mask mandate in classrooms. However, they continue to require that we have a COVID-19 mitigation policy in place. This policy includes using the Learning Genie "Daily Health Card", temperature checks at the door, children staying home when sick, and adhering to all Los Angeles County Health.

The weekly testing requirement for unvaccinated staff will continue until The Office of Head Start provides a final rule on that specificaly. Staff and families may also request test kits when needed.

We will continue weekly testing for unvaccinated staff, practice good handwashing practices for staff and students to mitigate the spread of illnesses, and follow any changes to the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health guidance in the event of increased COVID-19 transmission rates.

Staying Healthy

Routines are key to keeping healthy. Brushing teeth, washing hands, eating well, and exercising every day help everyone grow and thrive. "Every so often" routines, such as doctor and dentist checkups, ensure that families have the support, information, and care they need to help kids stay well!

Involving Parents in Children's Oral Health



Parent involvement in oral health is key to their child's overall health and well-being. Parents who introduce, reinforce, and model good oral health behaviors and attitudes pass them on to their children. Parents can do this by brushing their child's teeth with fluoride toothpaste every morning and before bedtime and by giving their child healthy foods that are good for the teeth. Also, when parents take their child for dental visits regularly, the child is more likely to seek oral health care as an adult. This all helps the child build good oral hygiene and eating habits that will last a lifetime.

Head Start staff can help families engage in their child's oral health by:

- Asking parents about their experience taking the child for a dental visit
- Asking parents to show how they brush their child's teeth
- Suggesting that parents make simple, healthy snacks for their child using <u>Cook's Corner</u>: Recipes for Healthy Snacks
- Encouraging parents to model good oral health habits at home, like brushing their own teeth with fluoride toothpaste twice a day and eating healthy foods

Sippy Cup Recall

On Nov. 23, 2022, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) <u>issued a recall</u> of Green Sprouts Stainless Steel Straw Bottles, Sippy Cups, and Sip & Straw Cups. The bottom base of the recalled stainless steel bottles and cups can break off, exposing a solder dot that contains lead and posing a lead poisoning hazard to the child.

As part of its mission to save lives and keep families safe by reducing the unreasonable risk of injuries and deaths associated with consumer products, CPSC obtains the recall of products and arranges for a repair, replacement, or refund for recalled products. <u>Subscribe</u> to stay up to date on CPSC recalls.

Reading is Key!

ECE is committed to ensuring our students complete our program ready for success in elementary school and beyond! Research shows that "simple access to books is one of the biggest obstacles-and perhaps the biggest opportunity-in equalizing children's literacy. The number of books in a child's home has been shown to be the best predictor of his or her scores on reading exams," (Bridges; Children's Literacy Foundation). In an effort to assist families in increasing the number of books children can access in the home, our program is providing books for children and families. Books create warm emotional bonds between adults and kids when they read books together.

Books help kids develop basic language skills and profoundly expand their vocabularies—much more than any other media.

Books are interactive; they demand that kids think. Fiction and nonfiction books widen our consciousness. They give us new ways to think and new ideas. They expand our universe beyond time and place and inspire our own original thoughts.

Books develop critical thinking skills. A book is read by an individual. It has no laugh track or musical score that emotionally primes a reader's reaction. You alone decide what you think about a book and its contents with no one leaning over your shoulder telling you how to think.

Books develop and nourish kids' imaginations, expanding their worlds. Picture books introduce young children to the world of art and literature. Novels and nonfiction books stimulate kids' sensory awareness, helping kids to see, hear, taste, feel, and smell on an imagined level. Books inform our imaginations, inspiring creativity.

Books provide the opportunity to share cultural experiences. When kids read the same book, enjoying a common reading experience, peer bonds are built within a generation. When children, parents, and grandparents share classic books, extended familial and community bonds are formed creating a shared frame of reference.
